- A database and directory of coastal, marine and oceans public policy processes, legislation, sources of information and other resources
- Database and community network directory of people and organisations with expertise, experience and interest in the marine and coastal environment and biodiversity protection.
- Information on key submissions deadlines and processes.
- Information on marine and coastal events. SeaNet has information on the marine environment, legislation, international agreements, submission deadlines, sources of information, a review of agencies involved in marine management, where to go for help, and other useful sources of information.
